Household of Caroline, Princess of Wales (from 1727 Queen) 1714-1737

Caroline's household was funded out of the Civil List. As Princess of Wales, she received between £8,000 and £10,000 per annum for her household, plus £8,000 for her personal expenses from out of the £100,000 allotted her husband as Prince of Wales out of that fund. As Queen, this rose to £100,000 per annum.¹
